CBT AS A TOOL OF ASSESSMENT FOR MCQ BASED COMPITATIVE EXAMINATION

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INTRODUCTION:

Tests are educational assessments intended to measure ones knowledge, skill, aptitude, in a particular area. A test may be administered verbally, on paper, on a computer, or in a predetermined area that requires a test taker to demonstrate or perform a set of skills.

Tests may vary in style, rigor and requirements. There is no general consensus or invariable standard for test formats and difficulty. Often, the format and difficulty of the test is dependent upon the educational philosophy of the need, instructor, subject matter, purpose of recruitment, class size, policy of the educational institution, and requirements of accreditation or governing bodies and also purpose of conduction.

ASSESSMENT OF MCQ BASED COMPITATIVE EXAMINATION:

A multiple-choice question (MCQ) are composed of stem that identifies the question or problem, and a set of alternatives or possible answers that contain a key that is the best answer to the question, and a number of distracters that are plausible but incorrect answers to the question. Students respond to MCQs by indicating the alternative that they believe

best answers or completes the stem. There are many advantages to using MCQs for assessment. One key advantage is that the questions are easy to mark and can even be scored by a computer, which makes them an attractive assessment approach for large classes. Well designed MCQs allow testing for a wide breadth of content and objectives and provide an objective measurement of aspirant ability.

To assess aspirants of various competitive fields, right now we have two modes of tests, that is computer based test (CBT) and paper pencil tests.

Paper-and-pencil mode of assessment:

It is one of traditional mode of assessment formats such as written tests and also to standardized tests that ask candidates to use pencils/ pen to fill in bubbles on a scannable answer sheet. In the classrooms or in competitive tests paper-and-pencil assessment frequently refers to tests scored objectively, which are meant to measure memorized knowledge Paper-and-pencil test can either be selected response or constructed-response types. Selected-response items ask performer to select the correct answer from a list of options included in the item.

Many school based tests, KPSC, UPSC, NEET, KCET, teacher recruitment tests, university entrance tests likewise many tests are being conducted by paper pencil mode. The biggest advantage is that it lets an applicant skip a few questions in the course of writing the answers and get back to them at any point in time before the submission of the answer paper.

Computer-based tests (CBT) mode of assessment:

Computer-based examination has rightly increased, given the post-pandemic challenges. CBT provides a scaffold by minimizing the administrative burden of conducting examinations, reducing the time and effort that would otherwise be consumed on the laborious process of setting up examination centers, printing and distributing exam papers, and other overheads.

In contrast, the computer used for delivering the exam while being connected on an intranet/internet is referred to as a server computer. Therefore, computer-based exams take place in a client-server environment.

The appeal of online CBT lies in its functionality to streamline how educational assessments, certifications, or pre-employment tests are conducted in multiple ways.

CBT may or may not be connected to a server on the intranet/internet and may act as standalone testing. Once the exam is over, the result can be transferred online to a web server or locally stored on the computer's hard disk.

Benefits of using computer-based tests over paper pencil tests:
